ELEVEN BIRDS FOUND THIS WEEK WITH WEST NILE VIRUS IN MARIN AND SONOMA COUNTY

(Cotati), California September **29th**, 2004 the presence of West Nile Virus (WNV) has been detected in Sonoma and Marin county. WNV is a viral disease of birds that can be transmitted to humans by a mosquito that has fed on an infected bird.

Eleven more birds have tested positive for WNV in Sonoma and Marin County by the **Marin/Sonoma Mosquito and Vector Control District** in cooperation with the California State Health Department.

The birds were reported from the following County /Cities: **Marin County** – 1 Fox Sparrow from Bolinas in the area of Brighton Ave. submitted on 9/20/2004. **Sonoma County** – 2 Toluse Geese from Sebastopol in the area of Ross Station Rd. submitted on 9/7/2004, 1 Lesser Goldfinch from Sebastopol in the area of Furlong Rd. submitted on 9/15/2004, 1 Turkey Vulture from Sebastopol in the area of Burnside Rd. submitted on 9/15/2004, 1 Japanese Quail from Petaluma in the area of Utah St. submitted on 9/9/2004, 1 Common Yellow-throat from Cotati in the area of Derby Lane submitted on 9/10/2004, 1 Red-tailed Hawk from Sonoma in the area of Arnold Dr. submitted on 9/11/2004, 1 Fox

Sparrow from Sonoma in the area of Alta Sonoma Rd. submitted on 9/15/2004, 1 Domestic Duck from Healdsburg in the area of Alexander Valley Rd. submitted on 9/17/2004 and 1 House Sparrow from Graton submitted on 9/20/2004. This brings the total of WNV positive dead birds to fifty-one in the two counties (38 in Sonoma County and 13 in Marin County). **The California Department of Health Services will no longer be accepting dead birds from the following cities/zip codes:** Cotati, 94931, Forestville, 95436, Petaluma, 94952 and 94954, Rohnert Park, 94928, Santa Rosa, 95403 and 95404, Sonoma, 95476 and Tomales, 94971. **These areas are now considered endemic to West Nile Virus and dead birds will not be accepted.** **Birds will still be accepted from all other zip codes in the two Counties until further notice.** The detection of WNV in wild birds indicates the virus is present. No human cases or mosquito pools have been reported positive at this time in either County. The District is checking all known mosquito breeding sites and setting adult mosquito traps in the areas where the birds have been found. We ask that the public remain diligent in their own mosquito control efforts by checking their yards for breeding sources since they are generally the main source for mosquitoes.

Symptoms of WNV range from mild flu-like conditions, such as fever, headache, and nausea to a stiff neck, restlessness, stupor, delirium, and convulsions. Most cases are mild; however, fatalities can occur in extreme cases. There is no vaccine for WNV.

- Avoid being outside when mosquitoes are most active, between dusk and dawn.
- When engaging in outdoor activities, wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and apply insect repellent according to label instructions. Products containing the active ingredient DEET have been proven to be the most effective.
- Screen all windows and make sure the screens are in good repair.
- Identify and eliminate all sources of standing water around your property that can support mosquito breeding.
- Remove water from rain gutters, boat covers, tires, tree holes, plastic containers, and any other areas that contain standing water.
- Report dead crows, ravens, magpies, jays and raptors that have been dead for less than 24 hrs.
